Annual Meeting Highlights

More than 200 individuals, including 160 physicians, attended the 62nd Annual Meeting of the Mid-Atlantic Section, AUA at the Hyatt Regency Chesapeake Bay in Cambridge, Maryland. The meeting, held from October 3-6, 2004, included an exceptional scientific program and an enjoyable social agenda which took advantage of this unique eastern shore location.

This year's meeting began with a moderated poster session, featuring twenty exceptional posters, followed by a pre-meeting seminar entitled, "Men's Reproductive Health" moderated by Craig Niederberger, M.D. and featuring Drs. Raymond Costabile and Craig F. Donatucci. Topics included Andropause, Impotence/ED, and Male Infertility.

***HIGHLIGHTS* of the Board of Directors Meeting, October 3, 2004 and Annual Business Meeting, October 5, 2004 Cambridge, Maryland**

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY-TREASURER

Current membership statistics of the Section: 1,100 members (632 Active, 288 Senior, 68 Associate, 7 Honorary, 4 Affiliate, and 116 AUA Candidate Members).

The Board reaffirmed the implementation of the procedural rules of the Section and drop from membership in the Section, and the AUA, any member whose dues are in arrears for two or more years.

The Board will maintain the current investment philosophy of approximately 50% of assets in equities and 50% in bonds and money market, which closely parallels the philosophy of the AUA. The Board approved the Investment Guidelines as recommended by the Investment Committee.

Total assets of the Section on August 31, 2004 were \$831,259 with total receipts for the eight-month period of \$336,812 and disbursements of \$147,030 resulting in an operating surplus of \$189,783 before expenses for the Annual Meeting are included.

Drs. Dan Theodorescu of the University of Virginia and Dan Dietrick of Baltimore, Maryland served as the Section's first two representatives to the inaugural AUA Leadership Program. Fourteen representatives from the eight sections had a very productive dialogue and educational sessions regarding the AUA. The AUA will conduct the Leadership Program for a second year and then monitor the progress and success of the 32 trainees to see which graduates become involved in Section activities.

REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVE TO THE AUA BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Dr. Schellhammer reported on the following:

The AUA is in good health financially with total assets of \$85,506,271, an 18% increase compared to the previous year. Operating revenue was up by 12% and operating expenses were up by 17%.

The results of the AUA Membership Survey, which surveyed approximately 8,000 domestic and international members, indicated that government affairs and practice management are of extreme importance to domestic members and that socioeconomic issues rank number one of concern.

Members must submit a disclosure record to the AUA; failure to do so will result in exclusion from participating in AUA activities including service on committees.

The Publication Committee will be negotiating with two different publishers for the continuing publication of the *Journal of Urology*.

The AUA Board has expelled six AUA members who were involved in the recent pharmaceutical improper marketing practices scandal.

The American Board of Urology will be pursuing a process whereby a CAQ for Pediatric Urology would be issued.

REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVE TO THE AUA HEALTH POLICY COUNCIL

Dr. Steven Schlossberg reported that the AUA Health Policy Council would be restructured in order to become more functional and effective.

REPORT OF THE LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS COMMITTEE

Dr. John H. Lynch thanked Dr. Pahira for the honor of having served as Arrangements Chairman and expressed his appreciation to Dr. Pahira, Ms. Megan Tainer and Ms. Jill Beilke for their support in planning the meeting.

REPORT OF THE PROGRAM COMMITTEE

On behalf of Dr. Judd Moul, Program Chair, Dr. Pahira reported on the merits of the Scientific Program and thanked Dr. Moul and his Committee for the development of an excellent Scientific Program.

Dr. Pahira reported on the status of the AFUD/AUA Research Scholars Program and correspondence received from AFUD and the AUA. After discussion, the Board voted to renew the Section's offer to the AFUD/AUA Research Scholars Program whereby the Section would offer \$15,250 annually for a two-year period only if these funds were matched in kind by the AUA and that at least one of the scholars in the scholarship program would come from the Mid-Atlantic Section. It was further agreed that the offer to AFUD regarding the matching grant for AFUD scholarship would be specified as a David G. McLeod AFUD scholarship.

The AUA recently underwent a review by the ACCME for renewal of accreditation. The AUA will revise and distribute to all eight sections the specific procedures, guidelines, and regulations for maintaining compliance in receiving category one credits for CME approval for the Section's annual meetings. Successful negotiations with the AUA had occurred and continuing CME accreditation will be provided by the AUA for the Section's annual meetings.

NEW BUSINESS

The Board agreed to continue the waiver of registration fees for residents for the 2004 meeting and based on the financial report of the Section to be given at its next meeting would render a decision regarding the waiver of fees for the 2005 Annual Meeting in Phoenix.

The AUA Leadership Program kicked off in Baltimore in September with the aim of training two Section members from every Section to attend classes on AUA structure, leadership, communication skills, and ethics. Two of our members, Drs. Dietrick and Theodorescu, were selected and have begun the program. We look forward to their help both within our Section and the AUA committees.

We have nominated John Lynch to become the next AUA Secretary-Elect. Letters have been sent to all Section Presidents soliciting their support of our nominee. In October 2005 we must nominate a Section member for President-Elect of the AUA.

Potential candidates should consult the AUA about requirements for this position. If you wish to nominate a member or yourself, please contact me or Vic Augusta, Chairman of our Nominating Committee.

We are working on a new web site. Please review your own demographics in our roster and let us know if we must make any changes, particularly e-mail addresses, which often change.

There is a Spring meeting of our Board of Directors in April 2005. Please contact me if there are issues that you feel need review. As always, I encourage any of our members who want to assume active roles in our organization to contact me or any Board member. Your participation can be very rewarding.

Special thanks to my committee and Board members for putting in the time. I wish to also acknowledge the able assistance of our Executive Director, Bob Jones, and Meetings Manager, Megan Tainer of PRRI. They work behind the scenes to make our meetings and events run smoothly and professionally.

The Scientific Program, organized by Judd Moul, M.D. and the Program Committee, included 24 oral presentations covering the latest developments in our specialty. After a warm welcome by President John Pahira, M.D., the scientific program kicked off with a panel discussion on "What To Do With a Stone Patient When Lithotripsy Doesn't Work."

In addition, several guest speakers and presentations complimented the program. Two "Rapid Fire" panel discussions provided a lively debate of current treatments. The first, moderated by Harry P. Koo, M.D., featured five panelists on Pediatric Urology 2004. Topics covered included: Hypospadias, Undescended Testis, Vesicoureteral Reflux, Adolescent Varicocele, and Acute Scrotum/Testicular Torsion. The second investigated the "Biochemical Recurrence of Prostate Cancer" and experts presented their cases for: watchful waiting, salvage radiation therapy, early hormonal therapy, and novel therapies.

Moderated by Leonard Gomella, M.D., the panel on "Hormone Refractory Prostate Cancer 2004" asked the question, "Do We Have Anything to Improve survival and Lessen Suffering?" Additional presentations included "How to Survive and Prosper in General Urology in 2004", a panel moderated by Roger Schultz, M.D.; "A Health Policy Update from the AUA Health Policy Council" given by James Regan, M.D.; An "Update on AFUD Successes" given by Donald R. Lee; and "The American Board of Urology in the Next Decade" by Stuart Howards, M.D.

A special guest lecture was given by Robert G. Uzzo, M.D., entitled "Kidney Cancer 2004: The Novel Therapy Pipeline is Flowing!" and in a separately subscribed program, Dr. Michael Ferragamo gave an "Update on Urology Coding: 2004."

The Section was pleased to have Dr. Joseph W. Segura as the Hugh Hampton Young Lecturer. Doctor Segura presented a timely talk on "Management of Upper Urinary Tract Calculi: Current Concepts". Other distinguished guest speakers included Dr. Joseph Corriere, President-Elect of the AUA, on "What Can the AUA Do For You?" Another tradition of the Section's meeting was the Howard M. Pollack X-Ray Conference, presided over by Dr. Robert S. Older.

We extend our congratulations to all of the Residents who participated in the Resident Prize Essay Award Competition, and our compliments to the winning authors listed on the right. These winners should be extremely proud of their accomplishments.

In addition to the outstanding scientific sessions during the meeting, the Local Arrangements Committee, chaired by Dr. John H. Lynch, hosted a variety of events to insure everyone had an opportunity to take advantage of this lovely location. The Welcome Reception on Sunday evening greeted guests at the River's Edge and was followed by a dinner hosted by the Virginia Urological Society. A Crustino Night Theme Dinner on Monday was the perfect way to unwind and enjoy the locale and the President's Reception and Banquet completed the social events in grand fashion on Tuesday evening.

The MAAUA 63rd Annual Meeting - October 23-26, 2005 The Wigwam Resort & Golf Club / Phoenix, Arizona

A LITTLE HISTORY.....

For nearly 75 years, the Wigwam Resort & Golf Club has been a favorite destination for golfers, sun-seekers and visitors who yearn for an Authentic Arizona™ experience. Set on more than 463 picturesque acres in the Sonoran Desert, the resort is a lush oasis offering 54 holes of championship golf, renowned dining, and an old-world charm.

The Wigwam was originally built as a three-bedroom company lodge for Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company executives in the early 1900s. When it was discovered that top-grade cotton extended the life of rubber tires, the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company imported fine Egyptian cotton from the Nile Valley until World War I closed shipping lanes and a domestic cotton source was needed. A team of Goodyear executives, led by Paul Weeks Litchfield, was sent to Arizona where they found the climate, irrigation and growth patterns along the Salt River Valley to be similar to those in the Nile Valley, so Litchfield bought 16,000 acres along the Agua Fria River in 1916 to begin cultivation.

In 1918, Goodyear built a company lodge for its visiting executives, fondly named “The Wigwam.” Today, the existing Fireplace Lounge and areas of the Executive Offices date back to this original era.

In 1929, The Wigwam opened to the public as a resort hotel, originally considered a dude ranch. Between 1929 and 1941, the surrounding area began to grow and the resort continued to add a variety of amenities. The first nine holes of golf were laid out and designed by the gardener in the early '30s and a tennis court and swimming pool were built. The second nine holes of golf were



added in 1941 and Head Professional V.O. Allen, Jimmy Thompson and Master's Champion Horton Smith played the inaugural 18-hole round at The Wigwam.

World War II closed The Wigwam to the public from 1941 to 1945. Guestrooms were leased to military pilots who were being trained for combat at Luke Field (what is now Luke Air Force Base). Homes were built on Wigwam property to house defense employees.

In the late 1950s, Goodyear Tire & Rubber set out to make The Wigwam one of the most recognized resorts in the hospitality industry. Famous golf course architect Robert Trent Jones Sr., added to the existing 18-holes of golf to create two distinct golfing challenges – the Gold and Blue courses (gold and blue were Goodyear's corporate colors). The construction of the Red course in 1974 by Robert “Red” Lawrence, made The Wigwam the first—and to this day, the only—resort in Arizona to boast 54 holes of championship golf.

From a 13-room humble lodge to an award-winning resort with 331 luxurious, and newly refurbished casitas, the Wigwam Resort & Golf Club is truly an Arizona legacy.
